




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The Principal Writes

Training for Growth

The Anglican 'Vision for Growth' programme in Sydney's western suburbs has had a great deal of publicity lately, as the church tries to open up ministries in new housing areas.

MOORE COLLEGE is a vital link in that strategy as it continues to train and equip people for ministry.

One of those who's gained the benefit of the College's work is **TONY PATTERSON**, Resident Minister at the new housing district of **ST. JOHN'S PARK**, who attended **MOORE** from 1980 to 1983.

In this interview... he gives some impressions of the college and the contribution it can make to programmes such as **VISION FOR GROWTH**.



"...I don't think it really makes any difference whether it's in the 'Vision for Growth' area or any other area, the basic theological teaching needs to be the same, wherever there are people they need to know the truth. In that sense, Moore College is an ideal place to study because it's a very biblically based College and the lecturers are all very sound."

Q: Did you find your years at the college difficult?...

A: "...I think the minister at my church prepared me well enough for what would happen at the college. I was surprised at the intensity, the amount of work we were expected to do, that was the only thing that really surprised me. We had four children, so it would have been probably as stressful to us as anyone... but once having got into the swing of things... that took about one term... providing you had the right attitude and didn't waste time, it wasn't difficult to cope with."

Q: Is there much interest from your congregation members in training?

A: "There's maybe a myth around the diocese that you need to be super-intelligent to become a clergyman or to do the

training. I think may put some people from this neck of the woods off, before they even start. Even so, I've had a couple of people who have approached me and asked my advice regarding ordination or entry into Moore College."

Q: Why would you recommend **MOORE COLLEGE**?

A: "To commend it, one of its strengths which is making it into a unique place is that it's one of the few colleges with any sort of academic status that is still soundly biblically based.

I would recommend it on that point, very strongly. The lecturers vary, of course, but I've found them to be particularly stimulating. When I was there, I found **BILL DUMBRELL's** Old Testament studies, personally, to be very exciting and stimulating, and those sort of things are quite important.

Q: How does the time you spend at College, help you now.

A: First of all, it helped me academically. I know I keep labouring this, but that was the greatest contribution the college had to my development towards where I find myself now, and that's

really what it's meant to do. I did my curacy at **ST MARK'S DARLING POINT**, where you have a high rate of education and highly intelligent people. To relate to that kind of people you need a sound theological training, people who will question what is said and want to debate. Out in this sort of area, you still are relating to problems on a theological level. The problems are slightly different and you're dealing upfront with more active heretical groups. For example, Mormons are very active in the area and so the theological base is still very important but applied in a slightly different way. One of the most striking points of my biblical education was the overview of the scriptures I gained, and it's good to see how that is also coming out in the external studies course. When people enrol for the **P.T.C.**, they now do an introduction to the Bible which has a similar overview. It's helpful because people often go astray when they start looking very closely at some little portion of scripture. The overview gives you perspective."

PANANIA ESTABLISHES LONG TERM SCHOLARSHIP

The Anglican parish of Panania has established a 'Jubilee Fellowship Fund' for students at Moore College or Deaconess House, who may need financial assistance. The first grant of more than one thousand dollars will be available from March next year. The fund has been established through donations from the parishioners of Panania, and the investment of the money will provide ongoing support for financially disadvantaged students. PETER O'BRIEN IN CAMBRIDGE

Vice Principal Peter O'Brien is still excited about the results of his recent study leave in Cambridge. From May to September last year Peter spent his leave working on a commentary he's been commissioned to write on Philippians. The book will be part of the New International Greek Theological commentary series, which already includes titles by authors such as Howard Marshall and F. F. Bruce. Part of the time was spent at Tyndale House, a research library in Cambridge, and Peter says the contact with overseas scholars studying there was quite valuable. He says in one two-week period, he counted fifty people who he'd met and talked with about the state of northern hemisphere theological colleges.
