THE RECTOR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

The month of October will be a very busy one in Church affairs. The General Synod of our Church will be meeting in Sydney and one of the matters that will be discussed is the Constitution. If General Synod passes the present draft it will then be for the various dioceses to pass it. The Church will then be able to speak with one voice on many questions of great importance, and the Church does need to have a united voice. The Constitution setting up General Synod in its new form will achieve this. Under the new Constitution every diocese would preserve three things. Each would retain control over its own property, which would be held subject to the same trusts as at present. Each diocese would retain its own ritual and ceremonial forms intact. Each diocese would retain its own Prayer Book worship intact. Care has been taken to see that no vital doctrine of the Church of England will be imperilled. It is to be hoped that the Church as a whole will agree to the draft. We cannot hope to get a draft that will be wholly acceptable to everyone, but we must remember that we cannot preserve the fundamentals of our Faith and our Anglican Heritage by the framing of laws or by sets of rules and regulations, nor can one party force conditions upon another. It must be remembered that there are legitimate differences in the Church and the only way to overcome these difficulties is for us to approach them in the spirit of reasonableness having assured ourselves that the essentials are safeguarded. This present draft has gone further than any other draft in its guarantee of essentials.

I am pleased to be able to say that we shall have a visit from two of the visiting Bishops this month. Bishop and Mrs. J. A. G. Housden will be staying at the Rectory with us, and the Bishop will celebrate on Sunday, 2nd October, at 8 a.m., and preach at 7.15 p.m. The Bishop of Willochra will preach at 11 a.m. I trust there will be good congregations to welcome them, and hear their message.

At the end of the month we shall be celebrating our Patronal Festival. Special services have been arranged for October 30th being the nearest Sunday to All Saints' Day. The Confirmation of those now being prepared will take place in the evening of that day at 7.15 p.m. All Saints' Day falls on the Tuesday and there will be a service of Holy Communion at 7 a.m. and 10 a.m., with an Evening Service and a Special Film at 7.30 p.m. The following Sunday the Festival will close with Special Services throughout the day, and Lodge Prince Alfred will attend the Evening Service. I trust that these services will be a great inspiration to us all, and that we will make every endeavour to attend them.

The Churchwardens and Parish Council will issue an envelope with this month's Chronicle, asking for a special note appeal for our Church Funds. It has been decided that this note appeal will be made at Easter, Christmas, the Consecration Festival, and at the Patronal Festival (All Saints' Day). In our giving let us all give to God's work because we owe something to God, to dedicate a portion of our God given plenty to the furtherance of His work. Besides the ordinary running costs of the Church there is yet much to be done by way of maintenance, repair to Church property. Some eight hundred Chronicles are sent out each month, and we do ask that the eight hundred envelopes be returned with your offering to God.

I am still in need of District Visitors. This is very important work and you can help the work of God by volunteering for this work. Two vacancies need to be filled immediately.

With the coming of warmer weather I trust that our congregations will greatly increase. We look forward to greeting you, and making you welcome. We all need to worship, and to feed upon the Living Bread. Much of our difficulty, our problems, in the world today are caused by spiritual starvation; humanity has neglected its spiritual life. At root our problems are spiritual and moral problems. Conscience dies when the voice of God has been stilled in the Soul. Worship is the spiritual

exercise for the soul, and develops the character as God intended it to be. The Bible, the word of God and the sacraments are food whereby the soul of man is fed. Public worship is a confession of our Faith before men, and can be a great help to us all. God has given us a great land, with wonderful opportunities. It has been handed on to us by the pioneers and also protected in two world wars by our own kith and kin. In both cases many paid the supreme sacrifice, giving their day that we might have ours. Surely we cannot betray such a trust that has cost so much? Yet in these days of peace we see so much around us that indicates selfishness, lulling us into a sense of false security that can only result in one end, the loss of this goodly heritage. The Christian Faith challenges us to awake and put on the whole Armour of God.

NEW MISSIONARY ARRIVES IN MALAYA

Sister Kathleen Collett, latest addition to the C.M.S. team in the new villages of Malaya, arrived at her new work last month. She is now living at Salek South, new village, near Kuala Lumpur in Malaya, where she is assisting Sister Rhoda Watkins of South Australia.

She writes: "One of my first introductions to Malaya was to attend the Communion service at St. Mary's, Kuala Lumpur, conducted in English by an Indian with a Chinese pastor assisting — such a lovely service.

"I have already had the opportunity of meeting many of the staff here and it is a great privilege to be 'allowed of God' to have a share in this work."

There are now 600 new villages in Malaya and the Christian Church is working in about half of them.

SUCCESES AT SOUTH INDIA HOSPITAL

Every nurse in training at St. Mary's Hospital, Khammamett, South India, passed in the recent examinations, reports Dr. John Cranswick, C.M.S. missionary at Khammamett.

Another important event at the hospital was the installation of electricity, making possible many new advances for the medical work. This was greatly helped by the very generous gift from a Gippsland (Victoria) farmer and his wife.

During language study at Dornakal Dr. Cranswick has been able to make several trips with medical teams into nearby villages.

He reports that, though Christians are often the poorest section of the community, living in awful conditions, they manage to keep their homes spotlessly clean.

He adds: "In the villages we visited each home in turn. I was able to see the sick folk and tried to examine all the children I could coax to come near enough to me as, by assessing the children, one can find out a lot about the general health of the village."

HUGE SCHOOL WORK IN TANGANYIKA

More than 19,000 African children attend Church schools in the Diocese of Central Tanganyika, the missionary diocese of the Australian C.M.S. in East Africa.

This figure is revealed in a recent survey of educational work in the diocese.

More than half of these children are in primary schools, and the remainder are in secondary or bush schools.

The diocese is responsible for 222 school teachers in Primary, Secondary and Middle schools, and there are 145 teachers-in-training.

INDIAN EVANGELISM IN AFRICA

The arrival in Tanganyika of an Indian clergyman will mean a great advance in the work amongst Indians in East Africa.

He is the Rev. K. Mathai John, of Dornakal, South India. Mr. John is attached to the staff of the Cathedral of the Holy Spirit, Dodoma, but will spend most of his time working amongst his own expatriates.

There are more than 60,000 Indians in Tanganyika alone and they make up to a large extent the "small businessmen" section of the community. They also hold many government positions and, generally speaking, are persons of influence in the community.

Several moves have also been made in the diocese of Mombasa to expand evangelistic work amongst Indians.
