Our Sympathy

Miss Gladys Locke became the first President of ACW at its inauguration in 1966. She represented YWCA on the Committee which was called together to plan for greater communication between Christian Women's groups, and continued as a YWCA delegate to the State Unit until 1987. During this time she served another term as President and for a number of years during the seventies as Treasurer. From the early forties Miss Locke was involved in YWCA, as the State President, Chairperson of the Finance Committee and also many YWCA initiatives in the community. In 1966, a Life Member of the National Board, in 1973 a Life Member of the Perth YWCA and was honoured by the Queen in recognition of her service to YWCA Australia. The ACW Unit of WA was fortunate to have a member for so many years of the calibre and talents of Miss Locke. She will be remembered with love by those who knew her for her commitment to the Christian faith and her willingness to use her many skills and her time to support the aims of ACW. She was the first ACW Life Member of WA in July 1988. She passed away peacefully on the 29th May, 1990.

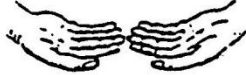

ACWC NEWS

Earlier this year Eunice Kim, Executive Secretary of ACWC, visited Cambodia and Vietnam. On her return she expressed concern about the plight of the people there and the need for material support and educational opportunities for the children.

Eunice has initiated support for the church people in Korea and she arranged for a consignment of clothes, shoes and toys to be shipped to Cambodia in June.

She is trying to raise money to help with medicines, and building of a hospital.

It is hoped that representatives from Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos may be able to attend the Consultation in Kuala Lumpur, however, it is very difficult for them to obtain passports.

Eunice and Monika Mannan (President of ACWC) have just returned from a visit to China. Due to lack of funds Monika paid her own way.

They report that the China Christian Council has joined the WCC from 1991 and there is quite a lot of interest in ACWC and it is hoped that possibly next year China may be able to attend one of our meetings.

Joan Tong and I will no doubt hear a lot more about the trip and have many things to share with you when we return from the ACWC Consultation on "ECONOMIC INJUSTICE TO WOMEN" to be held in Kuala Lumpur from 6 to 13 October, 1992.

Sri Lanka is a country often in the news due to the political unrest there and the fighting

that erupts in various parts of the country at regular intervals.

GRACE ARTHUR and SITA PEREIRA are their representatives on the General Committee.

Their Prayer Requests Are:

1. Pray for the forty percent of children in Sri Lanka who are malnourished.
2. Pray for the war to cease in the north and east of Sri Lanka.
