



## Opportunities that arise out of God's blessing...

There is no doubt that in recent years God has been blessing the College. He has provided us with increasing numbers of students. Moreover, the calibre of student applying to College is extremely high. The men and women are intelligent, godly and talented. All of this augurs well for the future. To see increased numbers of men and women going into gospel ministry is greatly encouraging. God is continuing to build his kingdom.

**Yet God's blessing brings with it a number of challenges.** The rapid growth of student numbers over the last few years will necessitate a rethink about the nature and structure of the college. The present way of doing things simply will not work in the future. This can be illustrated at a number of points: Growth in numbers

has meant that we are no longer able to fit into the college chapel. Meeting in the auditorium for chapel services means that we have to pack up and set out furniture each time we meet. All this takes time and effort and disrupts our program. Next year some of our lecture rooms will not be adequate for the numbers moving into them. Increased numbers have put additional pressure on the Registrar's staff and on the Faculty. For example, Faculty have the same time for marking but can have up to 50% more essays to mark than they used to have. New Faculty members may be the answer to this problem but people with the qualifications to be Faculty members are not easy to find. The rapid growth in student numbers has also put a strain on our financial resources.



**The steady growth in academic excellence over the years** has culminated in the Higher Education Unit recognising our own college degrees. The College now has the right to offer our own BTh, BD, MA(Theol) and MTh. We need to develop new syllabuses that really reflect our theological understanding and orientation for gospel ministry.

Some people might see these challenges as problems but we ought to see them as opportunities that arise out of God's blessing. **Please pray that the College will be able to meet these challenges and take up the opportunities that God has offered us.**


## Mission

The members of the various churches must now do the really hard work, as they continue to share Christ with their friends and disciple new believers. Please pray for them in this great task.

### Kiama & Minamurra

'See Change with Christ in your Life' proclaimed banners down the main street of Kiama. There had not been a Moore College mission in Kiama for many years, so the congregations were enthusiastic and had plenty organised. There were opportunities with school students - lunch-time puppet shows in primary schools and kid's clubs, high school Scripture seminars and youth fellowship activities. Older age groups held evangelistic meetings and one off events. The events were well attended and people heard the gospel and serious questions were asked and answered. The chance to explore things further through Christianity Explained courses was offered. Families came to church on the Sunday because of contacts made with children, and the evangelistic enthusiasm of the locals was renewed and given focus. The college team was greatly encouraged by the local congregations and we pray that the Lord will bring in a great harvest there.

Meals provide good opportunities for sharing the gospel and team members spoke at breakfasts, lunches and dinners. Four team members formed an impromptu band, and performed and shared the gospel at a couple of local pubs. A highlight was a bonfire and cracker night where a 100 people gathered to watch the fireworks and be challenged by the parable of the rich fool.

Fifty or so scripture lessons together with school assemblies and chapel services, daytime ministries including kids plus, KYB, lawn mowing ministry and others, then there was lots of door knocking, inviting people to come to events - this all made for quite a week! These included a women's supper and talks on reconciliation, a men's dinner with a talk on 'Rebelling from Great Expectations' and a band night for youth. At each event there was a strong gospel message and many people were challenged in conversation to turn to Jesus as Lord and rethink his death and resurrection. Overall it was a very encouraging week, with many gospel conversations and now the church is following up several contacts.

The lectures are held at Chatswood, Liverpool, Miranda, Newtown, Parramatta and Pennant Hills.



*Zac Veron, the Senior Minister at St James Carlton writes...*


I see two main benefits of Moore College teams coming:

1. People become Christians when the gospel is preached. There are hundreds of thousands of lost souls within a driving radius of our church. The more people we have joining us in our mission to reach those lost people, the larger the number of people who will hear the great news of rescue through Jesus and be saved from hell.
2. Student Ministers receive valuable experiences and ministry principles. The sixth paragraph of our church's Vision Statement states, 'We dream of planting and equipping churches ... we dream of being a teaching church to help other churches and their leaders as they too serve Christ.' One of the highlights of the week for me was to be able to spend time with the Moore students. Together with my colleagues on the St. James staff and David Mansfield who joined us for the week, we fielded their questions on ministry and modeled how to lead a thriving, loving church community in a multicultural, predominantly blue collar, non-Bible belt area of Sydney. Every Sunday is a great day to bring someone along to our church and this was especially so during 'Mission Week'! We had a huge number of activities during the week that reached out to all ages. We were thrown out of a room we had booked for the TAFE seminar, but this did not stop the gospel being preached as we came together on a nearby patch of lawn! Over 100 adults are interested in hearing more about the gospel message. We are currently following these people up. It was a terrific week.




## Unichurch University of Queensland

Brisbane was wet and dull but the Mission was vibrant and alive. We worked alongside the Unichurch, and the Christian groups at the University. There were many things to praise God for, the walk-up evangelism at the universities, resulting in a number of non-Christians agreeing to meet up and read the bible; and five girls became Christians at a chapel service. Most mornings found the team out talking and leafleting on campus, generating awareness of the daily talks and panels, and meeting up with contacts made on the previous days. In the evenings there was intense discussion at a number of dialog meetings at the residential colleges, causing most of them to run happily over-time. A healthy list of new contacts was handed over for follow-up to the unichurch and to the Christian groups. God granted us great fellowship with mutual learning and encouragement with the Christians at church and the University.



# Much Passion; More Training!



Many Sydney Christians don't appreciate the mountains of blessings we have been given. That is, until we lift our eyes and take a look at other places around the world.

There are quite a few people at Moore College from abroad this year. We spoke to some of them. Between them, three countries on the fringes of the world-stage are represented: *Slovenia, Sudan, and Chile*. Speaking to them, one common thread runs through: the greatest need for evangelical churches in these countries is training.



## Slovenia

'In terms of evangelism, people in Slovenia are generally suspicious,' says Peter Novak. 'Churches are growing but many Christians are young and struggling with their faith.'

'We would like to see more training, more church planting, and more solid Bible teaching,' Peter continued. 'We hope that after our studies at Moore we can return, either to do student work or to plant a church.'

## Sudan

'In the last forty years of civil war there has been little peace,' says Bernard Suwa, who with his family arrived in Australia, from Sudan 18 months ago as refugees.

'I think the situation in Sudan may be even worse than in Afghanistan,' he shares. 'I have old school friends and colleagues in ministry who are here no more. A friend preaches with a broken jaw because the Muslim authorities had arrested and tortured him.'

'The greatest need for the churches in Sudan is discipleship and training,' he says. Today the churches are growing, but the leadership of the church has passed into the hands of men and women who have no formal education so the danger of heresy looms large.'

'So we really need people to go to the Sudan to train the pastors and teach the Bible. But, they have to be very courageous' he adds.



## Chile

Moore College is in partnership with the Anglican Church in Chile to start a Training College for Pastors. Currently, two students are studying at Moore College to feed directly into this new venture. Cesar Guzman is doing his M.A. in theology to take up the new role as Principal of the 'Centre for Pastoral Studies'; while Pato Oyarzun is in the first year of a B.Th. and plans to return to Chile to teach part time at the college in three years.

The Anglican Church is beginning to take root in Chile. 'We have 100 churches but only 33 ordained ministers,' says Bishop Zavala. 'This means that 67 are without a full-time pastor and are in lay hands.'


Pato adds, 'Most of the current people in ministry have been through a good diet of Moore College external courses but some haven't had much at all.'


## Barry Webb


