



THE RECTOR'S LETTER

22nd June, 1971.

My Dear People,

Our Lord Jesus Christ said in the sixth chapter of St. Matthew's Gospel; "Be careful not to make a show of your religion before men, if you do, no reward awaits you in your Father's house in Heaven. Thus, when you do some act of charity, do not announce it with a flourish of trumpets, as the hypocrites do in the synagogue and in the streets to win admiration from men. I tell you this: they have their reward already. No: when you do some act of charity, do not let your left hand know what your right is doing, your good deed must be secret and your Father who sees what is done in secret, will reward you."

These words of Jesus actually need no explanation for they speak plainly to all our consciences. But perhaps a few words of explanation will help. When Jesus refers to announcing our charitable activities with a flourish of trumpets he is referring to that all too human failing of blowing our own horn, of trying to draw attention to how good we are. It is, of course, pride that drives us to seek this self glorification. And pride we know is THE besetting sin. "By that sin fell the angels." Jesus says that Christian behaviour must be pure, unmixed, and consistent.

If we do some service or kindness out of Love for God, then that is our full reward—the Love of God. It is something we experience in our innermost selves and we do not have to be told whether we have it or not. If we really have it—we know it. Virtue is in fact its own reward. But if we have to make a great big noise about it, then it begins to look like we were not doing for the love of God and our fellow man, but for pride—some sort of self-glorification. And if that is all we are working for, then, Jesus says, that is all we will get. "They have their reward." And of course having not done it for God, they have nothing of God in the end.

And so Jesus bids us to purify our motives; and be wholly children of Heaven, not slaves of this world. We must not seek the shallow glory of men's praise at the expense of our soul's salvation. Therefore do not let your right hand know what your left hand is doing; which is poetic for not letting your most intimate friend know of your generosity. For God who sees all will know. And if it is God we seek to please then that is all we need to know. The word "Hypocrite"

comes from the Greek word for an actor in a play. But a Christian must BE what he seems to be. No play acting.

And this "Silent Service" philosophy of Jesus is not contrary to the rule of "Let your light so shine before men that they may see your good works and glorify your Father which is in Heaven." For genuine sacrificial service to God and mankind is one of those light-giving good works that will glorify God. Men will see this genuineness in the true Christian and praise our God for it. A general rule is: "Show when tempted to hide, and hide when tempted to show."

One other point on purifying our motives for service. We must be careful never to think that we can earn salvation. By doing good works we cannot force God to give us a place in Heaven. Our salvation is always a gift from a friend. If we are not friends with God we can not expect Salvation. And a gift is not earned; or else it is not a gift. Heaven is where the heavenly minded go. They rest with God because they walked and worked with God. They sit at His great banquet table because they are His friends. And so as something to remember, think on this: "Christians do not do good deeds in order to be saved, but because they ARE saved, they do all manner of good deeds."

CHURCH NEWS

● **Evensong:** A reminder that our Sunday evening services are commencing at 6 p.m. during July and August. We earnestly hope that by bringing the time forward an hour, more of our parishioners will come to our Evensong Services.

● **Confirmation:** Wednesday night classes have begun for those seeking to be confirmed in October. Any of the young folk, or adults who wish to be confirmed, and who have not yet spoken to the Rector, are asked to contact him as quickly as possible.

● **New English Bible:** At its June meeting, the Parish Council agreed with the Rector to the using of the New English Bible for the reading of the Lessons at our Services. This is permitted by Diocesan authorities, and enables the congregation to hear the scriptures read in a language in many instances clearer and more meaningful today than the wording of the King James or "Authorised Version" of 1611. We will also be seeking the Archbishop's consent to place in the Church a large size copy of the New English Bible, suitable for lectern use; this Bible will be given as a memorial.

● **Your Own N.E.B.:** The New English Bible is not a revision of the A.V., nor does it replace it—it is a new translation of the whole Bible in current English, suitable for use in worship, teaching, and private reading. Its purchase by every home in the parish would thus be most worthwhile. The standard Bible, containing both Old and New Testaments costs \$5.40 (hard cover). For only a slightly increased price, you may buy a version incorporating the Apochrypha. Also the Old and New Testaments may each be purchased separately.

● **Parish Roll:** As it is now some 14 years since the parish roll was compiled, it is high time that it was revised, and plans are being made to check as much of the parish as possible later in the year. Please watch for further news.

● **District Visitors:** We are happy to report that for the present, we have received offers from sufficient ladies to take over the existing vacancies in our District Visitors' panel. We are grateful to those who have come forward in response to our recent appeals. We would also like to take this opportunity to express our most sincere thanks to both

Mrs. Cook and Miss Bayley for their faithful and devoted work as Visitors' over a good many years, and also to wish Mrs. Humphreys a happy trip as she takes her well-earned holiday.

WEEKLY ENVELOPE SYSTEM

We would like more of our parishioners to give us some practical financial help on a regular weekly basis. This is necessary in order to ensure that the Church will be able to perform its functions adequately within the Parish.

The best way of contributing is to use the All Saints' weekly duplex envelope system. It provides for and encourages regular, systematic giving on your part, and if you are away, the idea is that you still give your weekly contributions, and bring the envelopes when next you come to church. Secondly, the envelopes encourage missionary giving, by providing a separate pocket for your donation to the work beyond this Parish.

We have a number of sets of envelopes to give to parishioners willing to make good use of them. The system is entirely confidential, and you are not asked to promise a set sum to the Treasurer. Tell God how much you will give in return for His mercies, and let your conscience be your guide. The Rector, Wardens, or Church Officers will be happy to issue your envelopes.
