Greetings from Mrs. (Lt Col) E Baker President NSW Unit

Warmest christian greetings' The Easter season which has passed reminds us that Jesus reveals himself in different ways to his followers. The form in which he reveals himself is determined by the particular needs of mankind at the time of his appearing. He is Lord of all human need. Since our needs and circumstances are different from those who have travelled before us, he appears to us in a different form.

In Mark 16.12, "He appeared in another form unto two of them as they walked and went into the country." The two travellers on the way to Emmaus saw Jesus as no one else had seen him. So he may appear in one form to you and in another form to me, and yet be the same Jesus all the time. Following the resurrection, for the disciples, there were aspects of Christ they had never seen. So it is still, for as life advances for us, new needs emerge, but Christ is sufficient to meet those needs. In Hebrews 13.8 we read, "Jesus Christ the same yesterday, today and forever." This inspires us to meet change that 'will surely come'.

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The period between Easter and Whitsunday (forty days) have ^{not} passed in vain if they can help us to realise again how many are the ways in which the Lord of life still reveals himself to his followers today.

On the twelve parapets of a bridge in Austria are twelve images of Christ in which he is represented as being occupied in various vocations. There is Christ the carpenter, Christ the farmer, Christ the teacher, Christ the shepherd, and so on. Men coming into the city bow before the Christ who represents the particular trade or work in which they are interested. So he appeals to all. Christ is indeed the Saviour of the world. As George Macdonald put it: 'Christ comes down each man's secret stair.' I am content if, on my Emmaus road, I can see him and experience the burning heart, even though he came in another form. As Paul puts it: "There are diversities of gifts but the same Spirit; diversities of workings, but the same God who worketh in all things.

SPECIAL CHURCH SERVICE IN CANBERRA.

The 10th Annual Service of Worship to mark the Opening of the 1978 Parliamentary year was held in St. Paul's Anglican Church, Manuka, A.C.T on Tuesday, 21st February.

For the last two years, a group of Members of Parliament known as the Federal Parliamentary Christian Fellowship have organised this Service of Worship on the first sitting day of each Parliamentary year, details and arrangements being managed by a group of Canberra clergymen, known as the Canberra Committee.

This year's service was attended by some 400 people, comprising Members of Parliament, representatives from various Departments, the Diplomatic Community and Canberra citizens.

His Excellency, the Governor-General read the Old Testament lesson, and the greeting was given by the President of the Federal Parliamentary Christian Fellowship, Senator Gordon S. Davidson (S.A). The sermon was preached by the Principal Grosvenor I. Inglis B.A., BD, of Adelaide.

As I look back on another year, I see one in which God has crowned with his goodness. During the year, it has been a joy and privilege to share experiences one had during the tour of S.E Asia at the beginning of the year. I am grateful to all the friends who, having seen or heard about the dark shadows of poverty, disease, fear and war faced by so many people in the areas visited, have responded with promises to pray and also with gifts.

There was the meeting with old friends and the making of new ones at the National Committee Meeting of Australian Church Women in Perth in July, 1978. I came home with the added responsibility of being one of the Vice Presidents of the Working Committee of A.C.W., a position I held 15 years ago when A.C.W was first formed.

The National Committee Meeting of the Women's World Day of Prayer was held in Sydney in February. Sixteen representatives from all the States in the Commonwealth gathered for that important meeting. An honour I never for a moment anticipated has been my appointment as National Liaison Officer for the World Day of Prayer. I have always looked upon the W.W.D.P as the movement that God brought into being to bring Christian women from different races and denominations to help them realise their unity in the Lord Jesus Christ. In 170 countries throughout the world the W.W.D.P is celebrated each year. The same theme and service is translated into many different languages, and is used over radio in schools, Churches, Meeting Halls, homes and gaols throughout the world.

Once every four years, the International Committee meets to which National Liaison Officers are invited. This year the meetings are being held in Lusaka, Zambia from 22nd to 30th April. I would value your prayers as I plan to represent Australia at the meeting.

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W.C.C aids South Australian Aboriginal Medical Team.

The World Council of Churches has made a grant US\$25,000. to the Port Augusta Aboriginal Medical Service. This grant from the W.C.C Christian Medical Commission was made in response to a request from the Medical Service through the Federal Council of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders.

The Port Augusta Aboriginal Medical Service (AMS) was established in August, 1976 by members of the Aboriginal communities of Port Augusta and Davenport reserve. According to Mr. Lance Coulthard, the Chairman of AMS, "the existing health services failed to deal adequately with the health problems of these communities."

During the first nine months of operation, the Service discovered a high incidence of chronic malnutrition, alcoholism, chronic infections, diabetes and hypertension. The alarmingly high prevalence of diabetes and hypertension exemplify according to an AMS report, "the serious nature of the population's present health status, and the urgency of medical treatment and prevention programmes."

To date, the Port Augusta AMS had to rely on donations from the Sydney AMS, and receipts from Medibank to finance operations. Requests for assistance to the Federal and State Governments have brought no response.

The World Council grant will assist in paying salaries and administration expenses as well as assist in purchasing much needed equipment.

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EYE TEAM FOR SAMOA.

Six Australian optometrists have left for Western Samoa. This team will identify specific areas and population groups which may be at risk of eye complaints. Research into the life style of the Western Samoans and its effect on their eye conditions will also be carried out.

Western Samoans will be trained by the team and some students may be sponsored to study optometry in Australia.

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UNDP EXPECTS RECORD FOR 1978

United Nations Development programme expects to raise a record \$US569 million for 1978 for technical assistance to developing countries, 9% more than last year's total of \$US524 million.

UNDP Administrator, Bradford Morse announced the anticipated contributions after a day-long Pledging Conference attended by delegates from 122 countries and held at the United Nations Headquarters. Development efforts in poor countries were showing more encouraging results than many people realised, he said. He cited increased life expectancy, improved nutrition, rising primary school enrolments and adult literacy grants in the 36 poorest countries since the 1960's.

FOOD AID TO BANGLADESH.

Australia will give 50,000 tonnes of wheat valued at \$A5 million under a food-aid programme. Wheat committed for the current year arrived in February and March.
